College Administrator Summer Survey 2024

About the Survey

The Princeton Review conducted this survey — the company's 5th annual summer survey of college administrators — online from July 19 to August 6, 2024. The 12-question multiple-choice survey was sent to administrators at 632 institutions. They included colleges The Princeton Review profiles in its book *The Best 390 Colleges: 2025 Edition* (August 27, 2024) and colleges featured in the company's website designation <u>Best Regional Colleges for 2025</u>.

Administrators from 246 colleges completed the survey which had a had a response rate of 39%.

By school type: 71% (175) were from private colleges 29% (71) were from public colleges.

By region, the locales of their colleges (and percent from each region) was: 26% Midwest (IL, IN, IA, KS, MI, MN, MO, NE, ND, OH, SD, WI) 26% Northeast (CT, ME, MA, NH, NJ, NY, RI, VT) 15% Mid-Atlantic (DE, DC, MD, PA, VA, WV) 11% West (AK, CA, HI, ID, MT, NV, OR, UT, WA, WY) 15% South (AL, AR, FL, GA, KY, LA, MS, NC, SC, TN) 07% Southwest (AZ, CO, NM, OK, TX).

The survey asked administrators about their fall 2024 enrollment, admission test policies, and the importance of college level coursework (AP[®], IB[®], and dual enrollment) on applicant transcripts in admission decisions. Administrators were also asked their views on trending topics. Among them: the botched rollout of the 2024-25 FAFSA[®] (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) and their outlook about the release of the 2025-26 FAFSA; efforts to block or restrict college DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) programs, and the use of AI in college applications and admissions.

The final question of the survey asked administrators to rank four issues in terms of which will be the top concerns among students on their campuses and which will be the top concerns among their fellow administrators in the coming school year.




